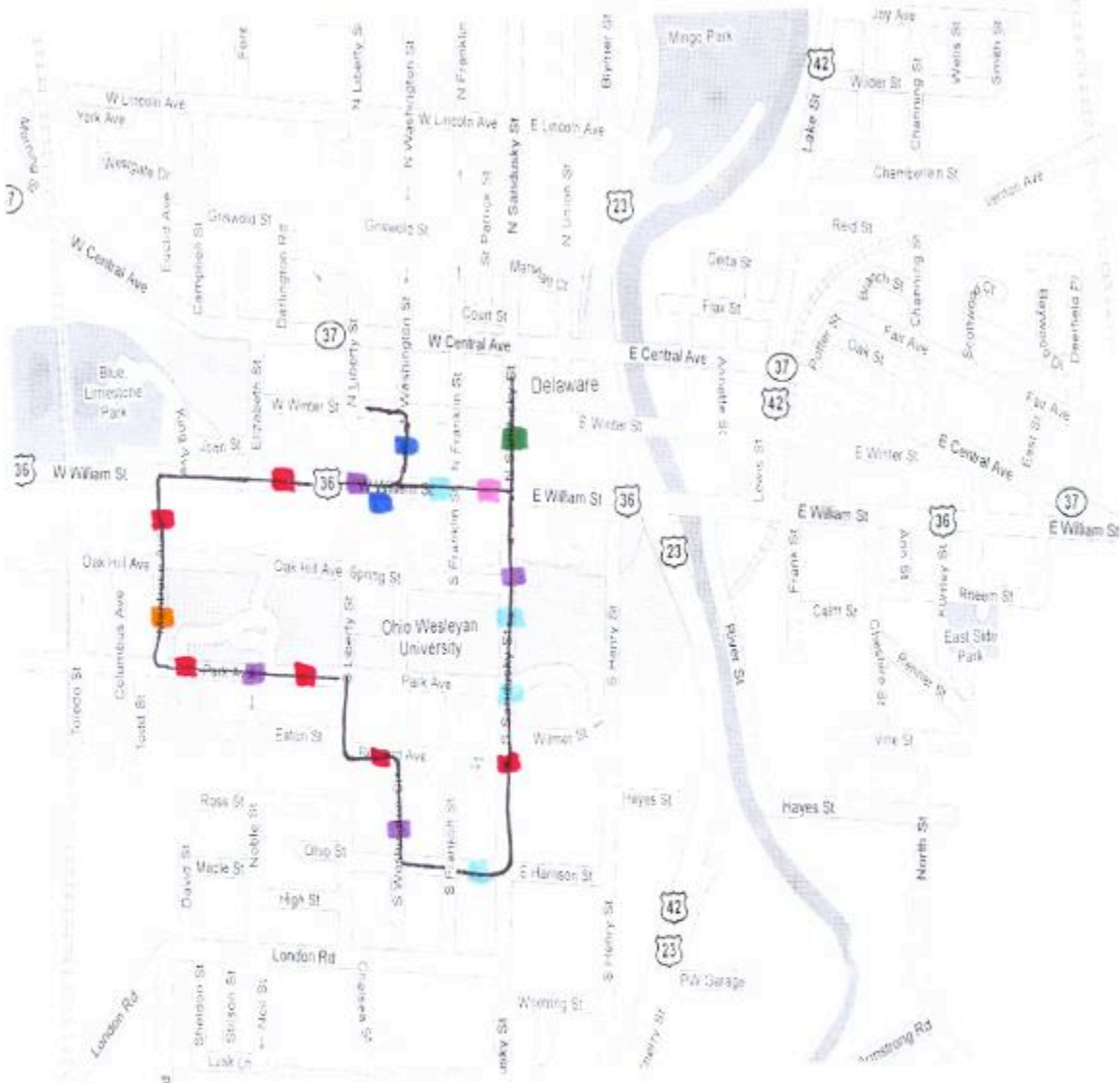

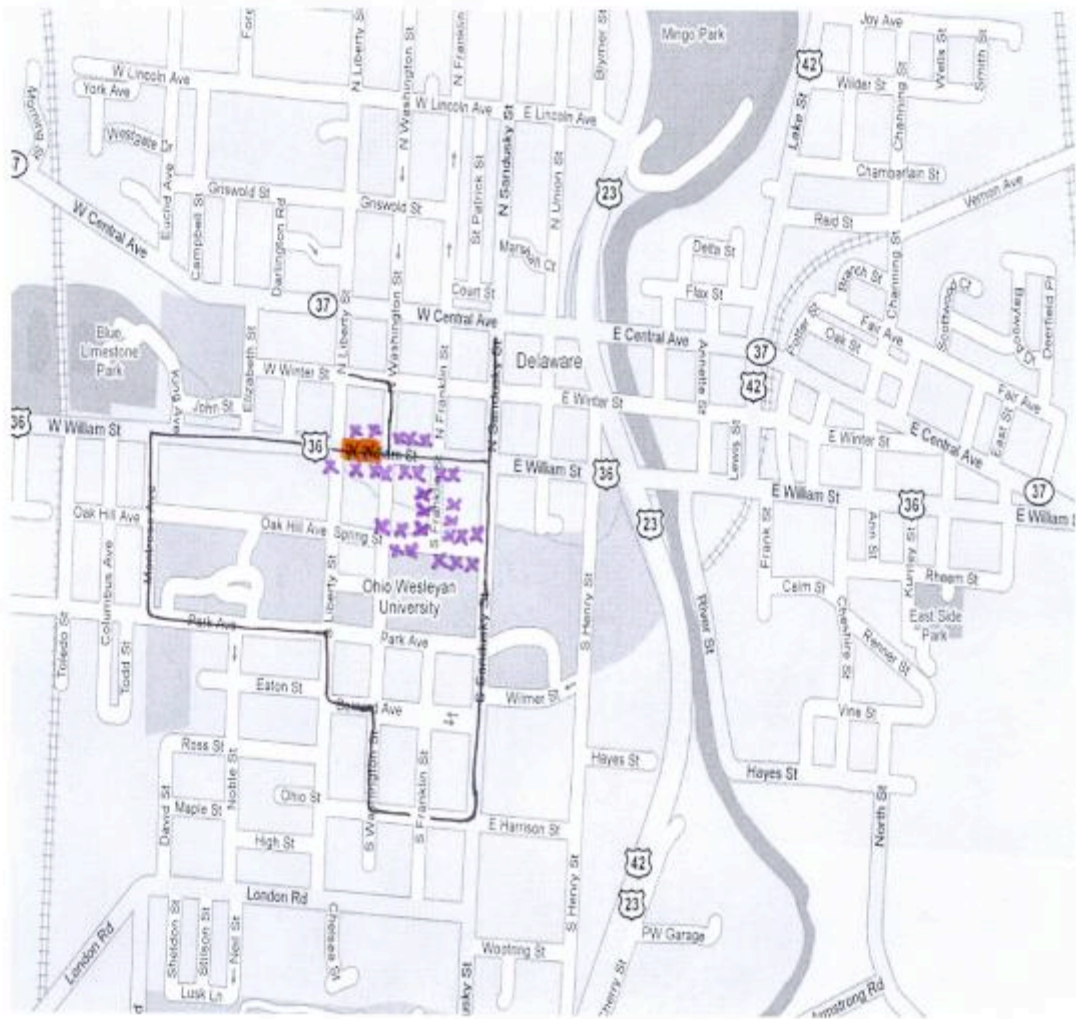

The Sadly Not Very Often Mapped in Downtown Delaware

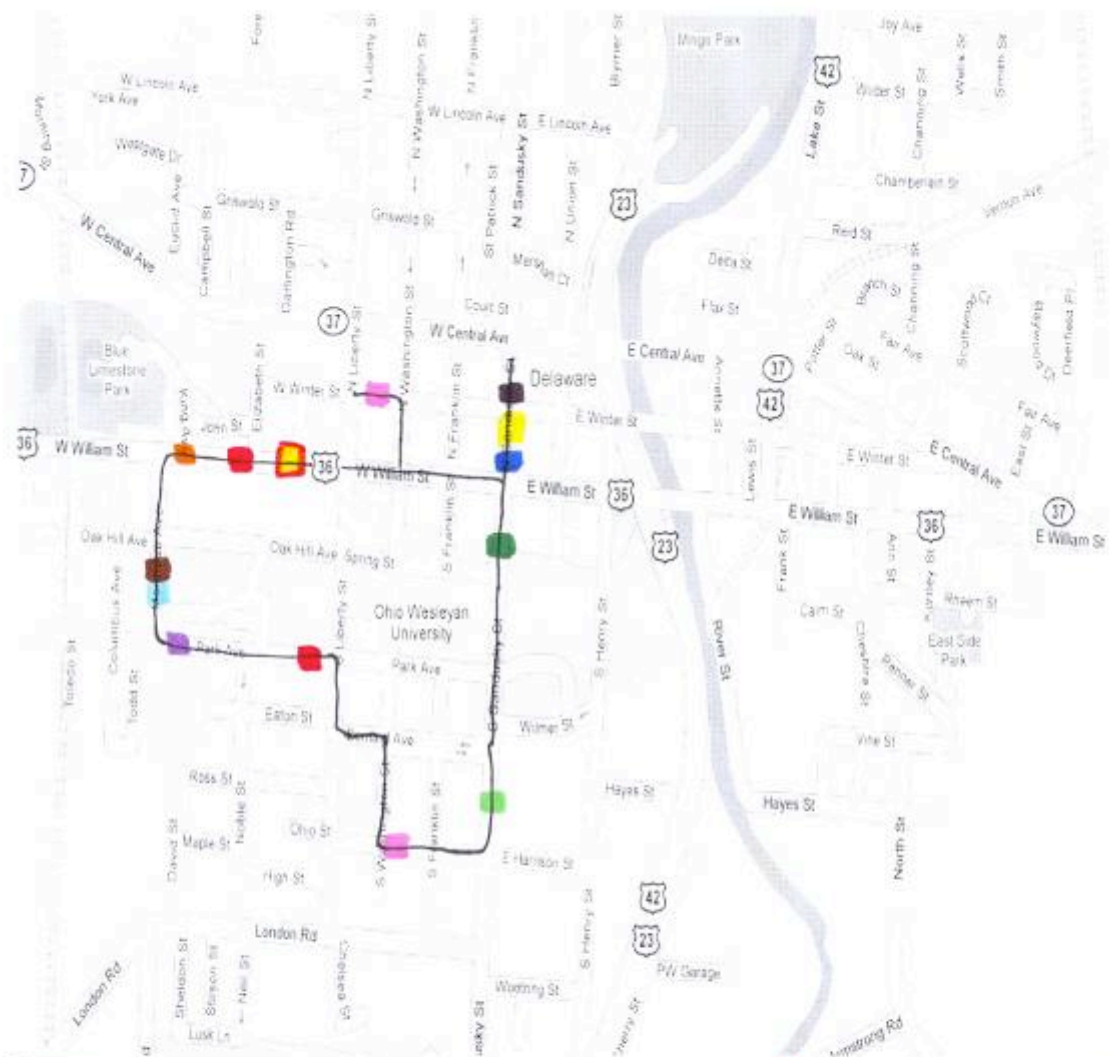

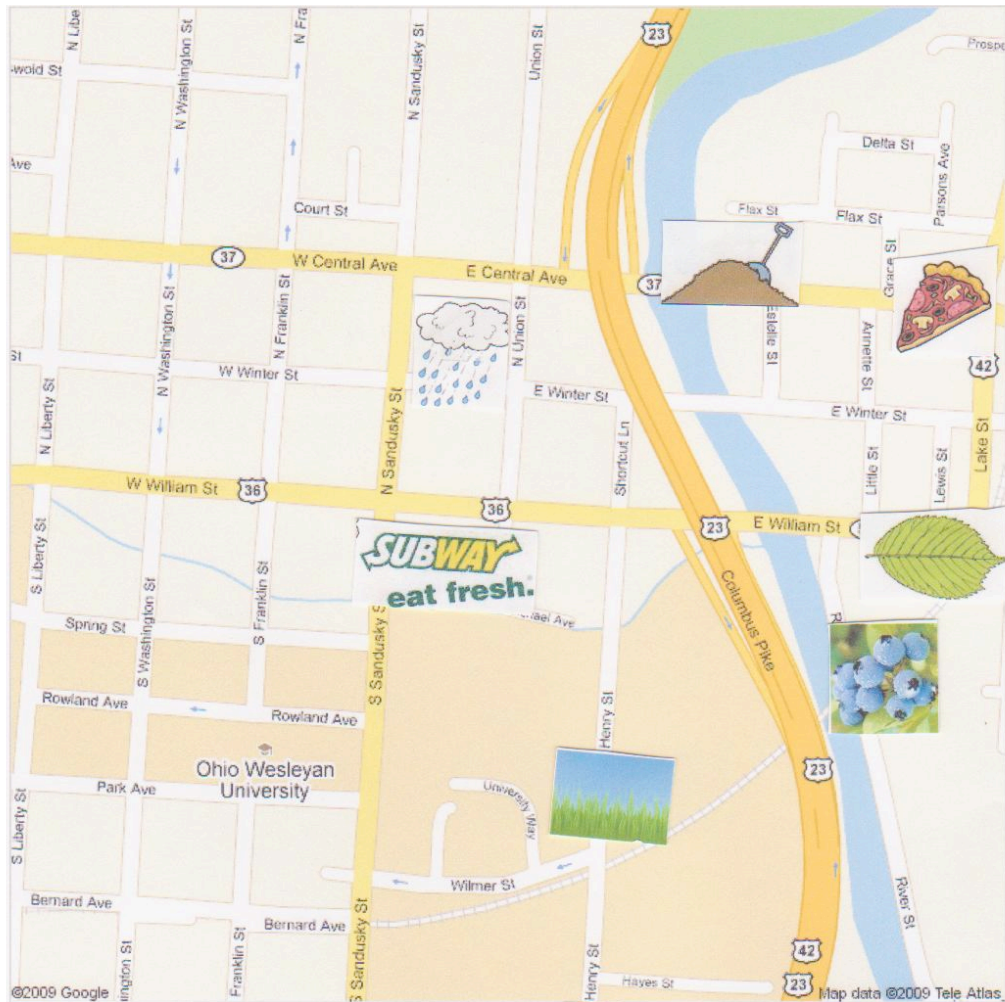

Map of Certain Textures around Our Circle



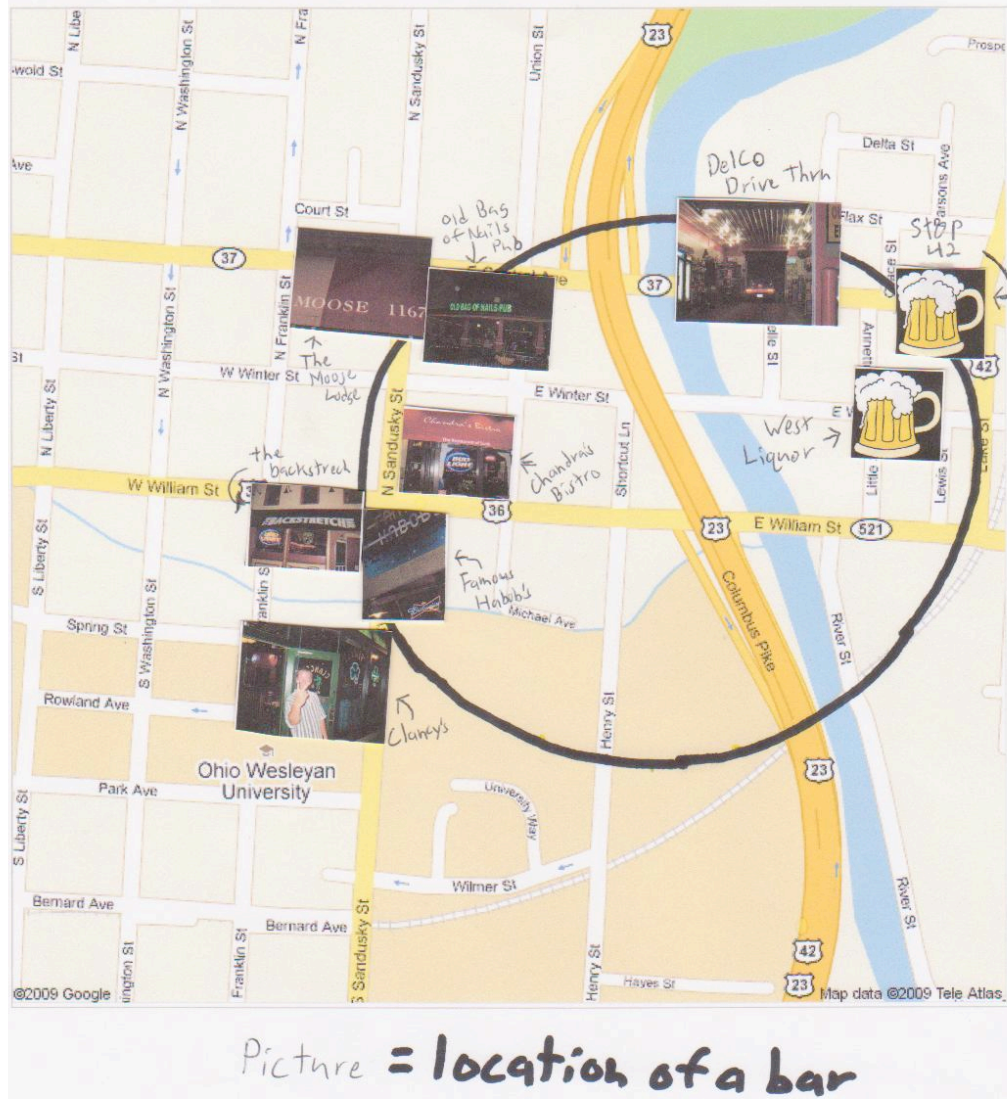

Map of Certain Things That We Tasted While Walking Our Circle

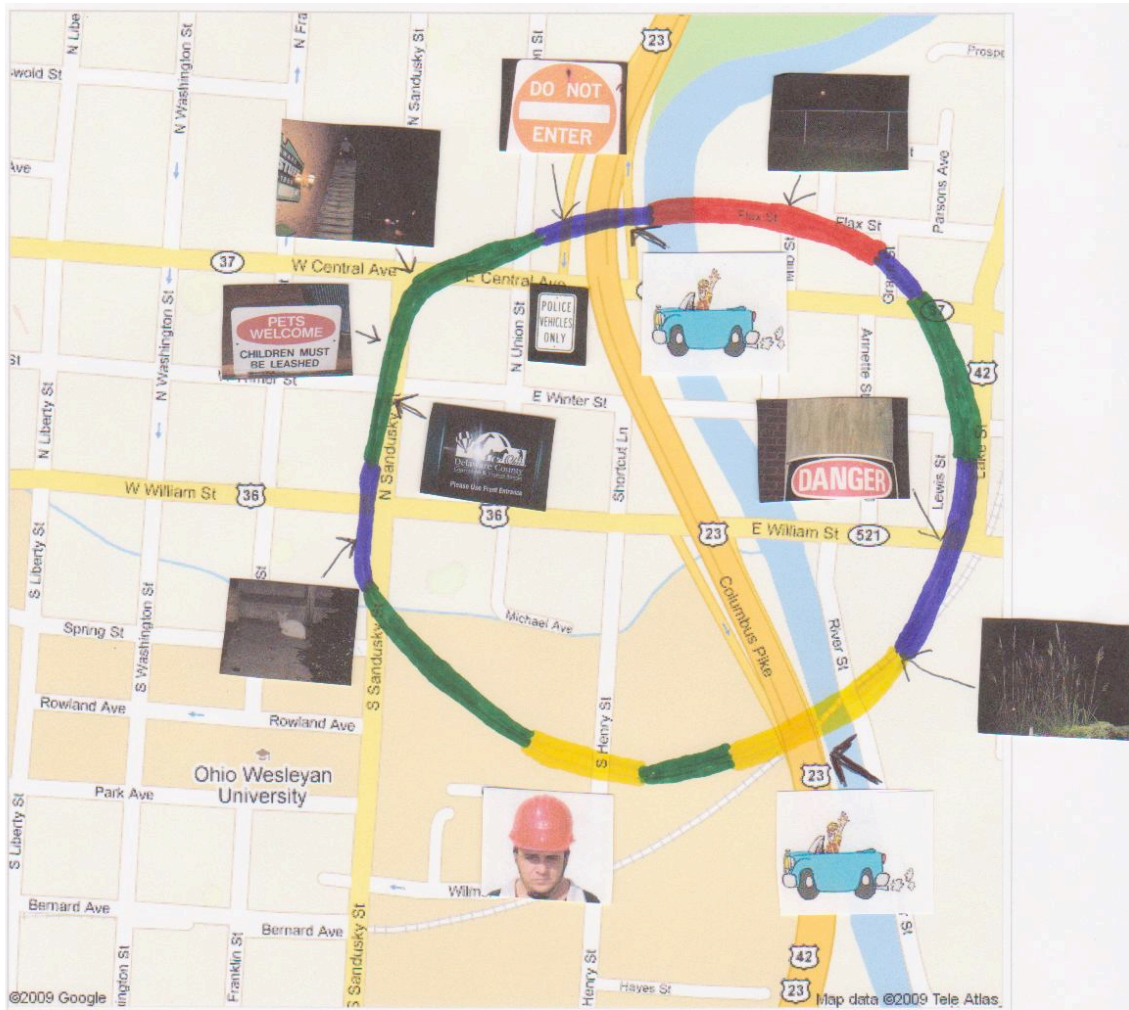

Map of Bars Located Around the Circle We Walked





Map of Psychological Response to Our Surroundings

The Touchscape, the Tastescape, and the PsychoScope

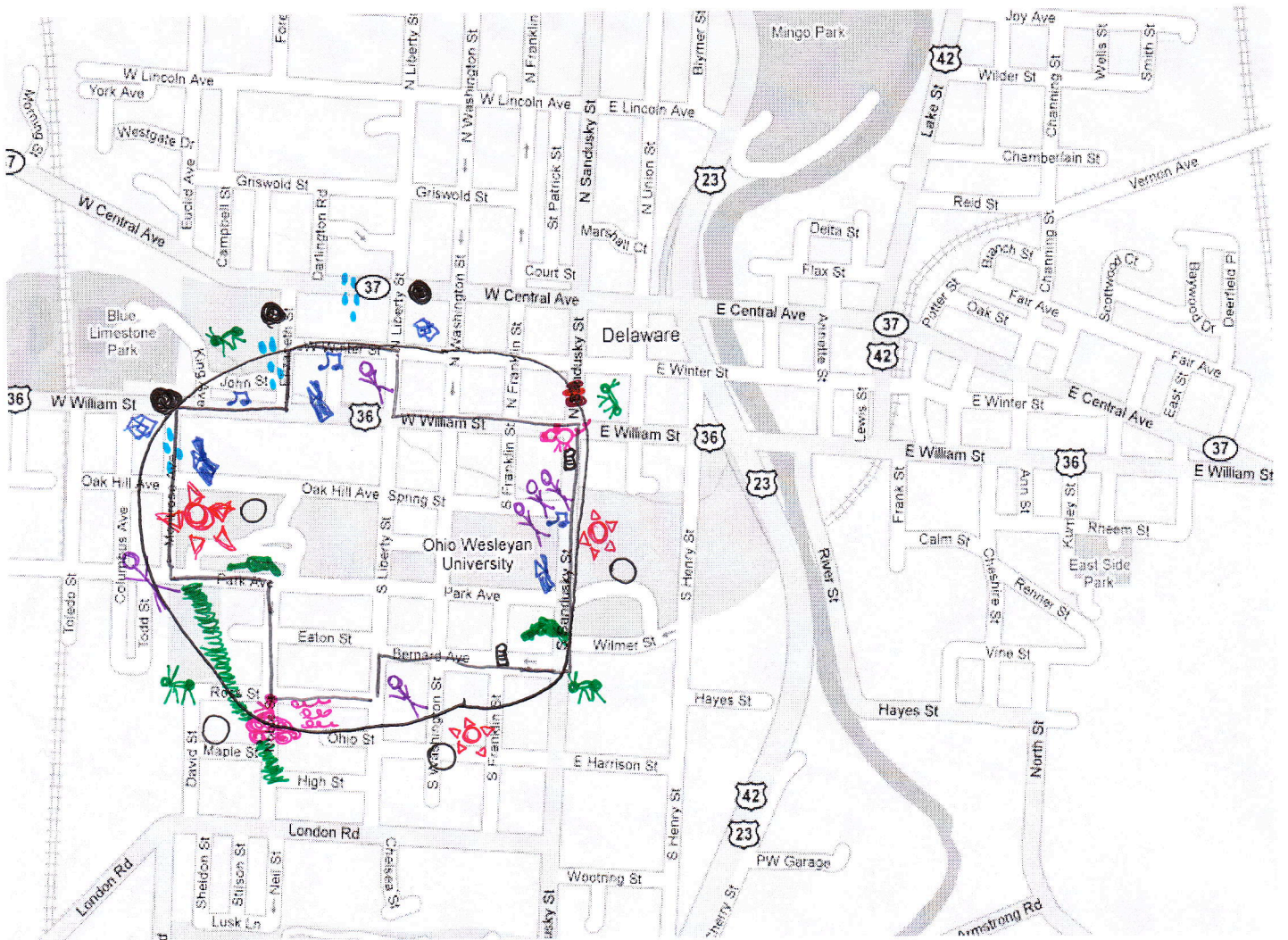
1 and 10: I started off behind Stuyvesant Hall. It was very hot out. The sun was shining and the wind was blowing quiet strongly. I thought that these three topics were pretty easy to relate to one another. I was touching what I was eating, and other things at Subway, and I was able to link moods with the things I touched and tasted.

2: The coolest, most noteworthy thing that I came across was some kind of carnival for little kids. I wasn't sure if it was just some special recess for a nearby school but it seemed like a pretty big deal. There were big jumping castles, a rock climbing wall, a cool really high monkey bars that kids strapped into harnesses for, and other things like that. I didn't get into the festival which would have been nice to get a feel of the rock climbing wall and the jumping castles. I did notice that as we were walking by this carnival it was much hotter and noisier kind of hostile. There were little kids having fun there, but all of the electric pumps keeping air in the jumping castles were very uncomfortable to walk by. PSYCHOGEOGRAPHY

The trip through Delaware was overall an enjoyable outing. It seemed simple and straightforward, but once I arrived at my starting point it became clear that it would be harder than I thought. How much to write down and document became an almost paralyzing dilemma. One could focus so intently on all of their senses and easily only cover a corner or crosswalk. Also the amount of anxiety that I had about traversing someone else's property surprised me. As the trip got on its way, the problems disappeared and the walk became more carefree.

Having lived on Sandusky street years several years ago I knew how loud the traffic could be. The surprise came at realizing that from Sandusky you could easily hear route 23's traffic. The other surprise was the noise of the crickets. Throughout my walk the sound of the crickets waxed and waned throughout both the offices of Sandusky st. to the quiet streets lined with brick homes. Although I had been down many of these streets and alleyways previously, I had not paid much attention or was in no state to pay attention as I meandered.

The quiet streets of Delaware reminded me of why I really enjoyed living here. Brick houses that look to have been built in the 19th century, or those that are kept up, give the feeling of true mid-western Americana. It becomes hard to not be nostalgic in moments like that. AS with many things, the nice well kept brick homes were countered by the other part of Delaware I have not missed in my years living elsewhere. Though my trip was through the nicer neighborhoods, the signs that we are living in tough times were abundant. Empty retail spots, vacant offices, abandoned houses, and empty lots for sale all reminded me that I'm not the only one adversely affected by the credit crisis.

Delaware is very symbolic of America and many of the changes, both good and bad, that are occurring through it. The noise of 23 drowning out the main street of the downtown tells a lot. Local stores are closed and with them the people that owned and worked there move on. The derive I went on was a smaller scale version of what we all do throughout our lives. Drawn and repelled by forces known and unknown through the country and the world.

Exercise 1

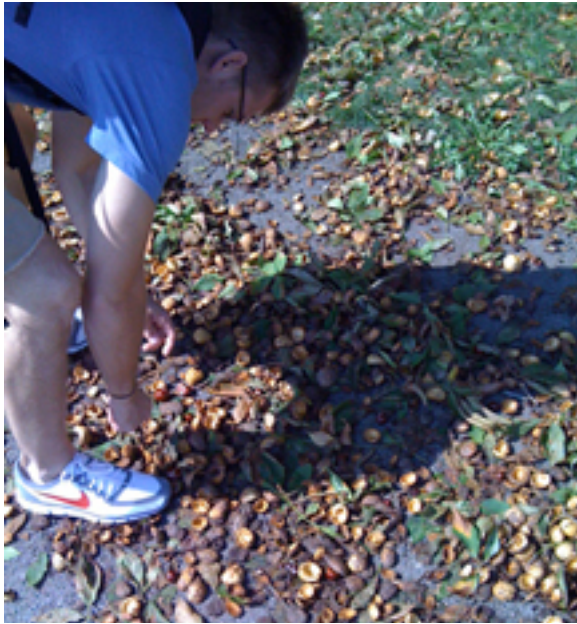
